#### Trustees Annual Report for the period ended 31 March 2018

The trustees present their report for the period from 1st April 2017 to 31 March 2018. This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and in accordance with the accounting provisions of the Companies Act 2006.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

The overall objective of the charity is the advancement of education for the benefit of public, particularly but not exclusively by the provision of financial assistance to students.

It is well documented that the 30 years long civil war has incurred great damaged in the livelihood of families particularly in North and East of Sri Lanka.

As a result, children and adult educations were greatly disturbed and the development and employment opportunities were hampered. Significant percentage of students are affected due to loss of family members, physiological damage (disability) and psychological damage (mental illness). Most cases those lost and damages were to bread winners of families. Future of many of today youngsters are in question. Thousands of youngsters who left schools with minimal qualifications are facing hazely future with very much limited opportunities due to lack of skills development programs. Local and national government left with so much to do not only in children, youth and adult development but also in other area such as health, environment, transport, housing, etc. It is clear outside support is required in number of area to re-build the society. LCH believe Education is an important area to tackle and provide much support as possible to help the society to move them forward and engage them in numerous development programs.

LCH developed its core values based on improving awareness through providing easy access to education not just limited to academic qualification but also hands-on experience to gaining confidence and allow the participants to easily engage in employments.

The aim of the charity during the period has been to secure more sponsors and continue with our core aims and provide as much support as possible to needy children, youth and adults.

#### Achievements and performance

2017/201 was another successful year; the charity has reached more and more people, online fundraising activity were expanded and more and more people taking part in our projects. Regular donations remain at similar level and charity is exploring new ways to increase regular donation. Coin box collection has been poor, trustees aware of this and drawing plan to improve the income. It is encouraging to see children, youth and their families are helping us in organising events and involved in fund raising. This financial year LCH supported fundraising for Tamil Para Sports (TPS) and Race for Education (RFE) hundreds of people including youngsters involved in both events.

Fifth Vocational Training Centre (VTC) program was completed on 29th January 2018 Kandawalai in Kilinochchi district. The VTC was managed by our local partner National Association for Humanitarian Rehabilitation Operation (NAHRO) who is an NGO and a registered charity in Sri Lanka. 18 students successfully completed the skill development program in April 2018 and this push the total over 73 students so far benefited from the program. Approx. 23% of them are in direct employment and estimated 8 - 12% of them are engaged in other form of employment. We received a good feedback and positive response from local about the VTC program and LCH is looking continue the program.

Educational sponsoring of students from poor background in Sri Lanka is continuing and now the charity is directly sponsoring two students at higher education.

Developing relationship with local community and Charites in Sri Lanka and UK has seen significant improvements this financial year and the charity continuously working on this area.

Charity conducted a cultural and musical show in Feb 2018 to encourage young talents, promote LCH and raise fund. Over £20,000 was raised from the event and with tis money a total of £3,000 was allocated for buying Perkins Braillers for visually impacted students in Jaffna, £1,200 allocated for a school agriculture project and £10,000 allocated for an educational transformation project.

#### **Future Plans**

The Trustees are aiming to increase the number of regular sponsors & corporate sponsors over the next three years and this financial year we have managed to raised over £7,000 from corporate sponsorship.

The plan drawn to promote the charity is paying dividend, the charity is now known to more local than ever before. New and capable team is slowly developing. While continuing to attract talented adults, the charity now focusing on creating plan to encourage youngsters to involved in various volunteering activities.

With this confident the charity has taken a large transformation project (esimated cost over £25,000) to improve education and livilihood of a village in Killinochi district.

#### **Structure, Governance and Management**

#### Governing Document

The organisation is a non-profitable company limited by guarantee. The company was established under a Memoraphymodi/3synciation which established the objects and powers of the non-profitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. The company was incorporated on 27 March 2009. The company was registered as a charity on 22 October 2009.

#### Recruitment and Appointment of the Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity Trustees for the purposes of charity law.

The Trustees regularly review the skills and experience base of its board to reflect the needs of the organisation. Induction is seen as a key element in retaining and supporting Trustees.

#### Management Committee Induction and Training

New Trustees are given clear advice and support in relation to their obligations. All relevant documentation is made available including details of its resource, the current financial position as set out in the latest set of accounts and information about future plans and the strategic development of the Charity.

#### Day-to-day management

The Trustees currently undertake the day to day management of the charity due to its current small size. The charity currently has no employees. And the Trustees hope to establish the charity as volunteer based organisation and try to maintains the administration cost as low as possible.

#### Financial Review, investment policy and reserves

#### Financial review

At 31 March 2018 the Charity had net assets of £64,083, all of which £56,312 is unrestricted and £7,771 is restricted funds.

The Trustees are confident that the Charity is financially secure to deliver its programme of activities for 2017/18.

#### Investment policy

As reserves are currently at a low level, all funds are currently held on a bank current and instant access deposit account. Due to scale of the charity and its activities, Trustees do not have an immediate plan for long-term investments.

#### Reserves policy

The Trustees aim to hold free reserves equal to 12 months' UK running costs. This is to ensure the continued running of the charity if unrestricted funding decreased, until new sources of funding were found. This gives a target for free reserves of around £500. The level of free reserves at 31 March 2018 was £64,083. If the free reserves are above the target level at 31 March 2018, the trustees will consider making an additional distribution of funds to Sri Lanka equal to the surplus.

#### Risk Ma Balance at 31 March 2018

The Trustees are currently developing their risk management strategy which will include the following areas:

- Students protection policies in respect of charity Trustees who will visit Sri Lanka;
- Financial controls to ensure that sponsorship money is not misappropriated in either the UK or Sri Lanka.

#### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Charity law requires that Trustees prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and its financial activities for that period. In preparing these statements, the Trustees are required to:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- c) state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- d) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operational existence

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charitable Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the preventions and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007) and follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities published in March 2005.

#### b) Incoming resources

Grants and donations are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable and are allocated to the appropriate fund.

Investment income is included when

#### c) Reserves expended and allocation of costs

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. They include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. They are allocated to the particular activity to which they relate.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. As the charity has only one activity, all costs, other than governance costs are allocated against the charitable activity.

Governance costs include those associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

#### d) Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.
